This is 16 week, <u>online course</u> that will be solely internet based. Course Description: HIST 1301 A survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, and intellectual history of the United States from the pre-Columbian era to the Civil War/Reconstruction period. United States History I includes the study of pre-Columbian, colonial, revolutionary, early national, slavery and sectionalism, and the Civil War/Reconstruction eras. Themes that may be addressed in United States History I include: American settlement and diversity, American culture, religion, civil and human rights, technological change, economic change, immigration and migration, and creation of the federal government

Methods of Teaching and Learning:

A variety of methods will be used in teaching United States History I including videos/lecture, discussion, written assignments, outside readings, and projects. These measures will assess critical thinking, communication, social responsibility, and personal responsibility.

Course Objectives and/or Competencies:

Critical Thinking: Through lecture and a variety of objective strategies, students will be assessed on critical thinking ability. Objective examinations will specifically be used to assess critical thinking. Other assessment vehicles may include essays, portfolios, primary source objective exams, and presentations.

Communication: Measures such as objective tests, written assignments, discussions, portfolios and presentations may be used to measure the student's ability to communicate.

Social Responsibility: Because the teaching of history involves evoking examples of successes and failures in social responsibility, and the continual importance of this issue politically and personally today, social responsibility naturally is emphasized. Assessment measures may include readings, primary document exams, discussions, projects and essays.

Personal Responsibility: Because the teaching of history also involves evoking examples of successes and failures in personal responsibility, and the consequences that personal choices can have, personal responsibility is also naturally emphasized. Assessment measures may include participation, readings, primary document exams, discussions, projects and essays.

Types of Coursework and Grading

<u>Course Orientation</u>: In here you will find the course requirements checklist-an assignment completed at the beginning of the course to confirm your understanding.

<u>Readings/Presentation Quizzes and notes</u>: Completion of reading and lecture assignments from a combination of textbooks and video. Then you will show retention by completing a short quiz.

<u>Text Analysis</u>: After reviewing a Primary Source you will answer a few questions analyzing the content. These are usually located within your textbook and page numbers will be provided.

<u>Discussion Boards</u>: You will provide a written response and at least one 50-word response to a classmate.

<u>Museum or National Park Proposal/Visit</u>: During this course you will visit a National park either virtually (online tour) or physically and complete a report.

<u>Projects:</u> Students will participate in projects that further comprehension, critical thinking, and communication.

Course Grading Information:

This course calculates your grade based on a point system. You will earn points with each assignment. At the end of the course if you have earned 900 points or more you will have earned an A.
