#### ADVANCED APPLIED COMMERCIAL GUITAR

2141 & 01

#### **Course Description:**

Advanced private instruction in electric guitar with goals related to commercial music. Demonstrate proficiency in commercial music repertoire and technique; develop a professional, disciplined approach to performance skills; and present a juried public performance or recital (Capstone performance).

#### **Prerequisites and/or Corequisites:**

Prerequisite: MUSP 1105 with a grade of C or better. Corequisite: Concurrent enrollment in a Commercial Music Ensemble – exceptions must be approved by program director. Semester Hour 1 (1 lec/3 lab)

#### **Course Notes and Instructor Recommendations:**

My plan for this semester is that students in this class will meet face to face with the instructor for lessons each week unless the college makes a change due to public health concerns.

Students will be assigned individual instructors at the start of each semester.

Students will keep a practice journal in which practice time, material practiced, questions and observations will be logged. The instructor will check the journal at two-week intervals.

A jury will be played at the semester's end for the string faculty. This will demonstrate the work done and progress achieved during the semester. Scales, arpeggios, chord studies and several songs will need to be prepared for this event. In the student's last semester, a public performance demonstrating skills acquired in a variety of musical styles will be presented. This is called the Capstone performance.

Students are required to practice <u>at least</u> one hour per day. Guitar majors should set aside time to practice 2 hours per day.

It is highly recommend that students purchase a metronome (or metronome app) and an electronic tuner (or tuner app). These items can be found at any music store or online from \$20.00

#### **Methods of Teaching and Learning:**

One on one demonstration-discussion-musical interaction, student performances / presentations.

#### **Course Objectives and/or Competencies:**

To develop the skills necessary to work as a professional guitarist by learning the following (at the current skill level of the student):

- 1) play a variety of **accompaniment** styles.
- 2) **improvise** using **scales** and **arpeggio** patterns combined with knowledge of chord-scale relationships.
- 3) **read** chord charts and melody lines.
- 4) play a continually expanding repertoire of songs.

#### **Course Outline or Schedule:**

Weekly grades will be given based on the student's progress toward the goals assigned at each weekly lesson. Fourteen 50 minute lessons will be given during the course of the semester. There will be no lesson the first week of classes while student and instructor schedules are put in place. There will not be a lesson during the last week of the semester as it is exam week and the student will have played the equivalent of the guitar lesson exam the week before on jury day.

Programs from five live MCC music department performances will be turned in before the end of the semester. This will count as 10% of the final grade.

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A jury will be played at the end of the semester. This will be a short presentation of no more than 10 minutes. The student will play material representative of the study done during the semester. This typically consists of the performance of one or more solo pieces and some technique studies such as scale or arpeggios. The jury performance will count as 14% of the final grade.
