Course Objectives and/or Competencies:

General: The student will develop competency in comprehending the meaning and understanding of community-oriented corrections. Increased knowledge in corrections has pointed to the need for closer ties between offenders and their families and the community. The student will understand the history of community corrections and the increasing utilization of

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probation, parole and diversion, the major trends away from institutional confinement, and as alternatives or supplement to confinement.

Specific: 1) To provide a better understanding of the community resources in corrections, and where they fit in the criminal justice system 2) To acquaint the student with the enormous challenge of supervising the offender living in a free society 3) To provide the student with some tools to use in dealing with problems of the offender released into the community

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Course Grading Information:

- A. There will be a Quiz due the throughout the semester it is recommended that you do them each week to cover the chapter that is to be covered that week. This will help ensure that students read the chapters and are prepared for class.
- B. Class periods will consist of scenarios based on the topics assigned per chapter. Students will work individually and in groups to answer these scenarios and debate their answers versus others in the class. Each class period will account for a daily grade ranging from 0 100 and will count toward students final grades.
- C. Written report: A written report is due on a specified date. Written instructions along with the rubric will be provided to each student. Papers will not be accepted late. Failure to complete this assignment will result in INCOMPLETE for the entire course. This assignment is submitted through the Brightspace platform.
- D. Students will do presentations over assigned topics as a final exam.
- E. It is very important that students attend each class meeting and regular participation in class discussions is encouraged. Students are expected to have read the assigned material and examination questions will come from both the lecture and/or the assigned readings.

Attendance and class participation will each be worth 5% of the students' grade. Student's will be allowed one absence for free and each additional absence will be deducted from the attendance grade.
