# **Course Description:**

Intensive study of and practice in the strategies and techniques for developing research-based expository and persuasive texts.

Emphasis is on effective and ethical rhetorical inquiry, including primary and secondary research methods; critical readings of verbal, visual and multimedia texts; systematic evaluation, synthesis, and documentation of information sources; and critical thinking about evidence and conclusions.

### Course Objectives and/or Competencies:

The purpose of this course is to have students engage in a semester long research project that facilitates 1) research skills 2) research methodology 3) research theory and 4) argumentative writing.

# **Course Grading Information:**

Final grades will correspond to the following scale: A = 90-100 B = 80-89 C = 70-79 D = 60-69 F = 0-59

Prefatory Paper #1: 10% Prefatory Paper #2: 15% Annotated Bibliography (all 20 sources): 15% Participation/Daily Work: 10% Research Paper (20 pages): 50%

The 20-page research paper is the crux of this class, and the entire semester will be leading up to this assignment. Students, towards the end of the semester, will turn in their final copy of this paper, *and* all copies of primary and secondary material used as sources for the paper. For example, if you were to quote from a certain page of a book, then the student would turn in a copy of that exact page with the final copy. Repeat this process for all 20 sources.

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# Late Work, Attendance, and Make Up Work Policies:

When possible, daily work can be made up upon request. All work, including papers, will be -2 points for each day late. Students must be present in class with their rough drafts to get credit for peer-review; the exception is when students are sick, they can still receive credit if they email their rough draft to me before class begins so that others can read and give feedback. Before every paper is due, students will bring a <u>hard copy</u> of their paper to class for a peer-review session. At this session, each student will read three other papers, and then their paper will be read three times. The <u>hard copy</u> is worth 10% of the total grade for *that* paper. The final copies of each paper will be due online via brightspace—for each day late, <u>2 points</u> will be taken off the total grade of that paper.

Paper will be turned in both online and in person.
