#### **Course Description:**

This course integrates the critical reading and writing skills students need to comprehend and Interact with college level texts and to produce original college level writing, in standard written English, through the process of generating ideas, drafting, organizing, revising, and editing. It focuses on textbook reading and academic writing at a Lexile of 700-1000.

Prerequisie: INRW 0401, READ 0301, ENGLISH 0301, or a satisfactory score on the TSI.
