Methods of Teaching and Learning:

Lecture, lab (in class), workbook assignments, take-home projects, exams, quizzes, class discussion.

Course Objectives and/or Competencies:

The student will sight-read advanced rhythms and melodies and transcribe dictation of advanced rhythms, melodies, and chord progressions. The student will demonstrate the ability to identify 7th, 9th and altered 9th chords.

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Course Outline/Schedule:

TEXT: Sight Singing and Ear Training IV Workbook.

- Week 1 Chord review, Mode review, Intro to Borrowed Chords, Intro to 16th rhythm patterns 1 and 2. SS & ET IV Workbook minor pentatonic and minor blues transcription Exercises 1.1 through 1.12 due Jan. 22nd.
- Week 2 In class drill on 7th and 9th chords, borrowed chords, minor blues melody transcription, and practice on Rhythms 1 and 2, Intro to Special Scales, chord progression practice.
- Week 3 Intro to Group 4 chords, intro to Rhythm pattern 3, chord progression practice use of augmented triads in chord progressions, special scales practice. SS & ET IV Workbook Exercises 2.1 through 2.11 due Feb. 5th.
- Week 4 Intro to Rhythm pattern 4, drill Borrowed chords, group 4 chords and Rhythms, chord progression practice
 - **Competency #1 Special Scales Identification**
- Week 5 Review Rhythm patterns 1 through 4, Group 4 chords, chord progression practice.

- Week 6 Intro to Walking Bass Lines, chord progression practice.

- Week 7 Intro to Slash Chords, Intro to Rhythm pattern 5, drill Group 4 chords, drill walking bass lines, chord progression practice.

Song Transcriptions

During week 10 of the semester, a CD or mp3 file will be given to each student containing two songs to be transcribed. Students will include the following musical components in the transcription: 1) melody line, 2) bass line 3) chord symbols.

The song transcriptions due the last day of class.

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These projects are to be completed **individually** and are **NOT group projects**. Any collaboration on either of the song projects will result in a failing grade in this course for those collaborating. If the instructor determines that the projects were played into a music notation program using a MIDI keyboard or other MIDI device, the result will be a failing grade for the student.

At least one transcription project must be successfully completed for the student to pass the course, regardless of how many other competencies have been passed.

Course Grading Information:

- 10 Competencies passed = A
- 9 Competencies passed = A
- 8 Competencies passed = B
- 7 Competencies passed = C

(at least 1 song transcription competency must be successfully completed to pass the course)

A point system of 1-100 points will be used for all assignments and competencies.

All competencies must be completed at 80% accuracy or better.

Each component of song transcriptions (melody, bass line, chords) must be completed at 80% accuracy or better.

Course credit will **not** be given for any grade lower than a C.

Late Work, Attendance, and Make Up Work Policies:

Workbook assignments that are late will have a letter grade deducted for each successive class meeting that follows the due date of the assignment. **Turn in the work on time.**

Competencies 1 through 7 can be made up during the final exam time for the course during finals week, during the final 3 weeks of classes and on other occasions during the semester as time permits.

- Seven absences will result in your being dropped from the class (or receiving an F if you have been dropped from 6 courses at the time the instructor initiates the drop).
- Arriving late to class 3 times will count as one absence.
