#### **COVID 19 Notice:**

### Course Description:

Application of communication theory and practice to the public speaking context, with emphasis on audience analysis, speaker delivery, ethics of communication, cultural diversity, and speech organizational techniques to develop students' speaking abilities, as well as ability to effectively evaluate oral presentations.

### Prerequisites and/or Corequisites:

There are no official course prerequisites. The student should, however, be able to speak, listen, and write in English, employing at least a high school level vocabulary and correct grammar. Writing, reading, and speaking skills are necessary for completing assignments. To improve inadequate skills for the level of this course, the student may take advantage of the college's reading and developmental English courses.

### **Methods of Teaching and Learning:**

Lecture, oral presentations, written outlines, group projects, online discussion posts, and other types of work.

### **Course Objectives and/or Competencies:**

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board requires that all courses in the Foundational Component area of Communication teach these four Core Objectives:

- Critical Thinking Skills (CT): “to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.”
- Communication Skills (COM): “to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.”
- Teamwork (TW): “to include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal.”
- Personal Responsibility (PR): “to include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.”

### **Learning Outcomes:**

- Demonstrate an understanding of the foundational models of communication. (CT, COM)
- Apply elements of audience analysis. (CT)
- Demonstrate ethical speaking and listening skills by analyzing presentations for evidence and logic. (CT, COM)
- Research, develop and deliver extemporaneous speeches with effective verbal and nonverbal techniques. (CT, COM, PR)
- Demonstrate effective usage of technology when researching and/or presenting speeches. (CT, COM)
- Identify how culture, ethnicity and gender influence communication. (CT, COM, PR)
- Develop proficiency in presenting a variety of speeches as an individual or group (e.g. narrative, informative or persuasive). (COM, TW, PR)

### **Course Notes and Instructor Recommendations**

## **Assignments**

### **Speech 1: Something to Share**

For this speech, you will choose a topic that you find interesting to introduce to the class. This is an informative speech. Therefore, your goal is not to persuade your audience to change their beliefs or take some sort of action. Instead, you should focus on providing information that will convince the audience that your topic is interesting.

### **Speech 2: Something to Do**

For this speech, you will choose a skill or process to teach the class. This is an informative speech. Therefore, your goal is not to tell us to do this skill or process, but to explain and demonstrate this topic in such a way that the audience will understand why being able to complete this skill or process is valuable. During this round of speeches, you will use visual aids to enhance your presentation.

### **Speech 3: Something to Believe**

For this speech, you will persuade the audience to accept a position using arguments based upon ethical, logical, and emotional appeals. The speech should be on one side of any controversial issue you wish. This means that you are to take a stand on the issue. You are to talk about something that you believe we should think or change. A successful topic for this speech is one that is both relevant to your audience and can be framed in terms of a belief that we can adopt. As part of your speech, you must address and refute opposing viewpoints.

### **Speech 4: Something to Support**

For this speech, you will work with a group to select a local, state, regional, national, or international non-profit organization that addresses a significant problem and develop a podcast that convinces your listeners that they should support it. This persuasive presentation will be organized using Monroe's Motivated Sequence. This speech will be recorded and edited using Audacity or some other audio recording and editing software of your choice.

## **Attendance Assignments**

To ensure that you are keeping up with course content and to help solidify your understanding of various topics that are used throughout this course, there will be online attendance assignments that you will need to complete each week. These will typically take the form of a discussion board post, but they might also include other work depending on the topic. Late work will not be accepted on these assignments unless you have a documented excused absence on the day the assignment was due. These assignments will be ungraded, however, since they are linked with attendance, failure to complete enough of these assignments will result in either being dropped from the course or a penalty to your grade.

### Grading Notes:

- Completion of each of the 4 major speeches is **necessary** to receive a passing grade in the course.
- Assignment guidelines and grading rubrics for all projects will be available ahead of time so you can make sure you are meeting project requirements.
- Grades for written speech documents will be factored into your total speech grade.
- I do not round up grades and **extra credit** is never offered on an individual basis. If extra credit is offered, it will be offered to the entire class. If you need to achieve a specific grade in this class, I highly suggest you meet with me early in the term to discuss what you will need to do rather than asking for more points later in the term.

## Course Policies

### Attendance, Late Work, and Make Up Work Policies

Attendance is **mandatory**. Since this is an online course, your attendance will be taken based on your completion of the required online attendance activities and speeches.

- If your reason for being absent is recognized by the College as **excused**, please let me know ahead of time and email satisfactory documentation to me within 2 days of the absence. It is your responsibility to make up any course material missed.
- Following MCC policy, being **absent** from more than 25% of scheduled class meetings (4 “days” of class) will result in being dropped from the course. If you have already reached the maximum allowable drops and cannot be dropped from the course, each absence beyond the 4 allowable “absences” will result in a 10-point deduction from your final grade.
- I do not accept **late work**. Although I will send out reminders regarding assignments, it is your responsibility to make sure that assignments are completed on time. Submit assignments early to ensure that if you experience technical issues they can be addressed before assignment deadlines. **If you will not be able to finish an assignment by the assigned deadline**, contact me before the deadline so I know your situation.
