Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the fundamental concepts of financial accounting as prescribedby U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to transactions and events that affect business organizations. Students will examine the procedures and systems to accumulate, analyze, measure, and record financial transactions. Students will use recorded financial information to prepare a balance sheet, income statement, statement of cash flows, andstatement of shareholders' equity to communicate the business entity's results of operations and financial position to users of financial information who are external to the company. Students will study the nature of assets, liabilities, and owners' equity while learning to use reported financial information for purposes of making decisions about the company. Students will be exposed to International Financial Reporting (IFRS).

Prerequisites and/or Corequisites:

Prerequisites: MATH 0311 or ACNT 1303 with a C or better or permission of the director.

Accounting is valuable to every profession. The importance of learning these concepts can be carried over into virtually every business sector. With continuous practice and building on the foundational concepts initially presented in this course, you will have an overall understanding offinancial accounting and be able to intelligently apply these concepts in whichever profession you chose.

- Describe the conceptual differences between International Financial Reporting Standards and U.S. generally accepted accounting principles.

Homework: There will be a homework assignment for each chapter. The only way to solidify your understanding of the concepts in this course is to do the homework assignments. All homework assignments will be due by Sunday 11:59 p.m. CST. Do not wait until the last minute to do your assignments.

Projects: You will have two projects in this course. The purpose of these projects is to help you tie all the concepts you have learned together and give you an overview of the accounting process. Detailed instructions will be posted in Brightspace when they are assigned.

Quizzes/Exams: You will have a quiz over each chapter that is covered and a cumulative exam over all the chapters.

Student Responsibility:
