Course Description:

Exploration of ideas using sculpture media and techniques, including additive and subtractive techniques. Prerequisites (for art majors only): ARTS 1312 and 1317 or consent of the instructor. Semester Hours 3 (6 lec/studio plus 3 hours minimum out of class)

Methods of Teaching and Learning:

Sculpture 1 is a study of the composition of form and space, including formal elements of line, shape and mass. All types of sculpture will be explored – carving, modeling, construction and assemblage, and installation. There will be four to five assignments over the semester. The student will be encouraged to cultivate their own creative instincts while investigating three-dimensional concepts.

Course Objectives and/or Competencies:

Sculpture 1 is intended increase student's ability to execute the principals of form and structure in completed three-dimensional works while cultivating their own creative instincts.

Course Outline or Schedule:

Sculpture I

Four to five in-class assignments will be given over the semester. Students will have appox. 2 to 3 weeks for each project. Work submitted late will not be accepted and will receive no credit.

Course Grading Information:

In lieu of exams, a portfolio of assigned work is submitted for evaluation at mid term and at the end of the semester. Evaluation is the instructor's assessment of how well the student accomplishes the objectives of the course as evidenced by the portfolio's uniqueness, creativity and convincingness along with attitude, effort and growth. Criteria for grading of assignments will be:

- 1) Level and quality of resolve to stated assignment
- 2) Level and quality of the individual expression
- 3) Effective use of materials (appropriateness of media to idea, invention and craftsmanship)

The final grade for the course is determined by averaging the mid-term grade with the end of semester grade plus participation. The grades will be broken down as follows:

90%---In class assignments

10%----Class participation, class critiques, absences

Late Work, Attendance, and Make Up Work Policies:

In-class assignments must be done in class under instructor's supervision. Gathering of materials must be done outside of class time. Students will not be excused from class to go get materials. If a student does leave class to get materials this will be an unexcused absence.

If a student misses 25% of the total class days they will be dropped from the class. For this class that is 7 days. These are the total number of absences allowed: excused and/or unexcused. If a student has 4 absences their grade will drop 1 letter grade. If they have 5 absences it will drop 2 letter grades. If they have 6 absences it will drop 3 letter grades. 3 times leaving early/arriving late 30 minutes will equal one absence.
